From the Pastor's Desk...

My Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,
Praised Be Jesus Christ...
Greetings from Blessed Mother!!!

EPIPHANY & POINSETTIAS...

Happy Feast of the Epiphany! We always make Christ know to all those we meet.

Dr. Joel Poinsett was U.S. Ambassador to Mexico in the early 1800s. In 1829 when he returned home, he brought with him a plant called by the Mexicans the "flower of the Holy Night." We call it the Poinsettia, after Joel Poinsett, and use it as a favorite Christmas plant.

It has a fabled origin that goes like this: Long ago, on Christmas Eve, a poor child made his way to Church in great sadness because he had no gift to offer the Christ child. Not daring to enter the Church, he knelt humbly on the ground outside and prayed, tearfully telling the Lord of his great desire to offer a gift. Unwilling to approach with empty hands, he finally rose only to behold springing up at his feet a plant with dazzling red, spectacular blooms. This was the answer to his prayers, These blossoms he took to the feet of the Christ child.

Since then, the "flower of the Holy Night" spread through the whole country, blooming each year at Christmas with such glorious abandon that the very sight of it filled believers with the spirit of this season of the Savior's birth. (The Catholic Source Book, 2000, pg. 457)

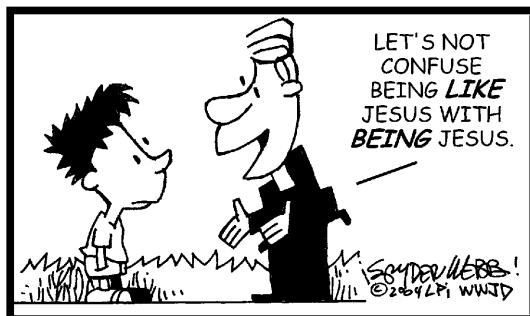
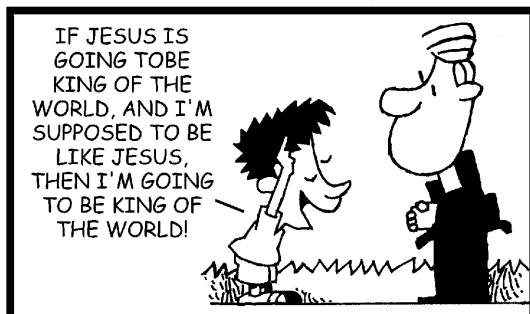

The Staff Corner...

Many people make New Year's resolutions thinking that by being properly motivated they will really succeed with their resolutions. Satan loves New Year's resolutions because by February 1 most of us have fallen short of our goals. Though we long for a better figure, a better whatever, the very idea of picking a day and deciding that we will change in a certain way or we will achieve something each day from then on does not usually work. These resolutions mirror the messages given in thousands of self-improvement books. Our resolutions come from a longing for something different than where or what we are.

What do you long for? What are you really thinking about when you feel empty? That is what you're longing for.

Our longings actually help us take the next steps to being what we long for. Hopefully, we are longing for the right thing because what we long for describes both our values and our needs. For example, if we long for love we may value peace at any price. If we long to be seen as the savior of a situation we may need disorder around us. If we long for attention, we may value crises.

One place we find longings in the Bible is in the Psalms. The psalmists did not live in dullness, lack excitement in their lives, or make New Year's resolutions! Somewhere along our life journey we all need to be like the psalmists and long for God. The psalmists long for God so much that God is what they are thinking about no matter where they are! God actually becomes a constant distraction to those who long for God.

Ok, so we have longings for things other than God! We should not be afraid of these other longings. Once we face them we can deal with them. Whatever we long for can help us grow in some way. To be able to long for something is a good thing because it tells us we are still searching. We may never get what we really want, but where we go is directed by what we want and long for. What we do, why we do it, and what relationships we have are determined by our longings, and directs our hearts.

What do you want in life right now? What kinds of things are you doing as a result of it? Are you better because of what you want?

Joseph Campbell wrote: "We must be willing to get rid of the life we've planned, so as to have the life that is waiting for us. The old skin has to be shed before the new one can come." It's easy to miss what we do have because of what we don't. Longing for God has the benefit of decreasing the longings that really don't help us grow.

My prayer for you is that instead of New Year's resolutions you will look at what you long for and find the path God has planned for you.

A New Year's Promise

The promise of Christmas is always followed by the promise of a new year; a time for new beginnings and resolutions aimed at changes for the better.

In some respects, this new year may not seem so promising given the challenges that lie ahead; the most striking of course is living in economic uncertainty in the coming year. While governments around the world are trying to find solutions to the current global economic crisis, many are left to wonder about their present or future job security, the status of retirement savings, or the adequacy of health care coverage. Many others must face more dire challenges such as the lack of resources to provide food, shelter, or heating for themselves and their families.

The start of a new year is a good time to reflect on the promises of Christ and the hope offered by the prophet Isaiah in the first Sunday scripture reading for the new year:

*"Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem!
Your light has come, the glory of the
Lord shines upon you. See, darkness
covers the earth, and thick clouds
cover the peoples; but upon you
the Lord shines, and over you appears
his glory" (Is 60:1- 2).*

As a people of faith we profess to live in hope that Jesus Christ is among us; our Savior who is calling us even more urgently in these anxious times. He invites us to come closer, and to know his strength and consolation.

We have lived through economic downturns before. And although many economic forecasters tell us that this time the forecasts look dimmer, we can imitate St. Paul and look upon anxious times as opportunities to be better stewards of our relationship with the Lord. Perhaps it is also time to adopt a simpler lifestyle; to remember to give God thanks for at least one thing each and every day; to better appreciate the virtue of community; and to open our hearts even more compassionately to those in need.

As we face the coming year with all its challenges, let us remember each day to turn to Christ, our promise and our hope. Let us discover new ways in which to experience the light of Christ shining on us and let that light shine through us, so we may offer hope to others.

Epiphany

The word epiphany comes from the Greek noun *epiphaneia*, which means "shining forth," "manifestation," or "revelation." The Epiphany of our Lord is the Christian festival that celebrates the many ways through signs, miracles, and preaching that Jesus revealed Himself to the world as Christ, God Incarnate, and King of kings.

The Festival of the Epiphany of our Lord originally commemorated three incidents that manifested the mission and divinity of Christ: the visit of the Magi ([Matthew 2:1-12](#)), the baptism of Jesus ([Mark 1:9-11](#)), and the miracle at Cana ([John 2:1-11](#)). Nowadays, most liturgical churches emphasize the visit of the Magi on January 6th and celebrate Christ's baptism on the first Sunday after the 6th. This year the Feast of the Epiphany falls on January 3.
